

People of the Word: Ruth

Last time we heard of some of the Judges who govered Israel. Later, it would be kings who would rule God's people. Today we meet Ruth, the great-grandmother of King David. She's one of a few women to have a whole book of the Bible bearing her name, and her story is beautiful.



The book begins by telling us of Elimelech, a 'man of Bethlehem' who leaves Israel and goes to live in Moab with his wife Naomi and their two sons. One of the sons marries Ruth, a Moabite woman. Both sons and their father die in Moab, leaving their wives. After this, and because of a famine, Naomi decides to return home. Ruth does not want to be separated from her mother-in-law, and so leaves her homeland and goes to Bethlehem with Naomi, where they settle. She gets a job working in a field for one of Naomi's relatives, Boaz, and later Ruth and Boaz are married. They have a son, Obed, who in turn has a son, Jesse, the father of King David.



Ruth's story is one of family bonds. She is willing to leave behind her homeland and so much that she has known, to go to a strange land, so that she can remain close to her mother-in-law. In her faithfulness, she finds great blessing: a new husband and descendents, among whom would be Israel's greatest king.

Questions for reflection:

- What are the most important relationships in my life? Who has God given me – family, friends – who give meaning to my life?
- Where does God call me to give of myself to build my relationships with others? Do I make sacrifices for the things that really matter in life?

Dear Friends,

First and foremost, Happy Easter to you and all your loved ones. This is the greatest feast of the year, because we celebrate eternal life: not only the life of the risen Lord Jesus, but the life of heaven He offers to each of us. So it's a feast which ultimately overcomes every suffering and every fear: Jesus has conquered death. Even this, ultimately, has no power over us now.

It's been a Holy Week unlike any other. In so many parts of the world priests have been celebrating the liturgy without a congregation in the church – even the Pope has had to do this. But it's been wonderful that so many people have joined us online for the liturgies of this week. I know that a large proportion of the parish is able to join us, and clearly many people from further afield have also been with us in prayer, watching online during the week. So we are united in the Lord.

Easter is a time when I usually take a moment to thank everyone for all you do for the parish, and this year is no exception! Whatever your part in the life of the parish, thank you for being part of the wonderful community that is St Clare's, and for the ways in which you help others in the community to live and celebrate our common faith in the risen Lord.

Many people have commented on our Benediction of Hospital, which takes place each week during the pandemic. Last weekend we streamed it live, and many people joined us in prayer for that moment. I'm conscious of many healthcare workers in our parish, and many other keyworkers who are making such a difference to others. Thank you. Let's continue to pray for one another.

Donations keep coming in for the Food Bank – thank you for that too. On our Facebook page we also put out a note about the 'Connected Hearts' initiative at RPH. If you can knit/sew etc., maybe you can help! Many charities are suffering loss of income during this time, so this week I was pleased to be able to send £800 to Aid to the Church in Need, money raised from various sources in the weeks before the lockdown, which will now go to help communities in Iraq.

I've spoken to quite a lot of parishioners on the phone now, and am continuing to work through the parish register. I am missing you all! In time I hope to speak to everyone whose up-to-date contact details we have. It will take a while.
